1. Objective findings. "Objective findings" are those findings which cannot come under the voluntary control of the patient. When determining physical or anatomical impairment, neither a physician (or any other medical provider) nor an Administrative Law Judge, the Workers' Compensation Commission or the Courts may consider complaints of pain; for the purpose of making physical or anatomical impairment ratings to the spine, straight leg raising tests or range of motion tests shall not be considered objective findings.
